

"(...)Now, with only one lesson still ahead of me, I can say I have had an experience of a lifetime. My students and I quickly fell into a routine of learning as well as playing. I hope in the coming years they continue to use the English they first learned in my class, as well as expand their knowledge to become scholars of the world. I'd like to say Dzienkuyeh to all that showed me the hospitality that Poland is so deservedly famous for. I will now return home and tell my parents, "I loved Poland!"
